The End of UU Elitism

—an excerpt from Rev. Fred Muir's blog

Like many of you, I was thrilled when I found Unitarian Universalism (or did it find me?). I've told the story many times; suffice it to say that the day and hour are branded into my memory (April 22, 1970 at 2:00 PM). I knew that here was finally a way of faith that lived up to the promise of religion (*root meaning "to bind together"*). Unitarian Universalism took the disparate parts of my life – intellect and spirit, probability and possibility – and pulled them together into one. What a great feeling! What a relief to feel whole.

So you might understand why I was shocked and dismayed when I read these words in Abraham Maslow's classic study *Religions, Values, and Peak Experiences*: "Nineteenth-century objectivistic, value-free science has finally proven to be a poor foundation for atheists, the agnostics, the rationalists, the humanists, and other nontheists, as well as for the 'liberal' religionists, e.g., the Unitarians and Universalists [who] leave out too much that is precious to most human beings." Maslow – one of the great progressive and positive psychologists of the twentieth century – goes on to deliver a strong indictment of our way of religion which he describes as cold and unfulfilling.

I was upset and angry and couldn't believe these words were coming from someone whose work I admired so much...Where did he go wrong, I wondered? Why didn't he see and know the Unitarian Universalism I was experiencing? It was years later when I realized that there was truth to what he said: "rational religion" had never done a meaningful and public job of "binding together" head and heart, intellect and spirit. For as long as I can remember, our way of faith has been experienced by many and viewed by most as only a rational one, a religion of the head where people were reluctant to get into the messy and often raw places of life – much better and safer to stay above the riffraff of feelings, spirituality, hope and possibility...

Which is to say, we come across as elitist and club-like, a faith for only a few. 250 years ago, when Unitarians were largely the Boston Brahmins (the white, wealthy, and educated who subscribed to an elitist orthodoxy), this seemed to work – at least it worked for them. But a funny thing happened over the centuries: UU evolved, as did the nation, as did the world...

As you've heard me share many times, I believe that our UU and UUCA are at a turning point. Please understand that I am not suggesting that we abandon educational thoughtfulness and the blessings of intellect which are important to faith development and a deepening spirit. This is what initially attracted me to Unitarian Universalism and I have no desire to

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leave these behind. Nor am I suggesting that we become a faith of only raw emotion, spirited feeling, and embodied practice ... What I'm seeking - what the future awaits is a balanced, complete religion. I want us to share what we think and what we feel; I love knowing that you are led by your head and vour spirit; I am deepened knowing that we feed the mind and nourish the soul. I want a faith that brings all of me/us together, binds life as one, binds us as a community. In short, I seek a way of faith that is not elitist: I want to share a religion that honors the whole person and welcomes all people.

Endowment Fund Supports Youth Arts Fellowship

Last April, the UUCA Endowment Board provided \$5,000 to Creating Communities, an organization established by Rob Levit, to support the Youth Arts Fellowship (YAF). YAF is an arts-based, alternative education opportunity that provides arts instruction, mentoring, and experiential learning at no cost for twenty 10th-12th graders who reside in the City of Annapolis and Anne Arundel County. Direct access to the arts is used as a vehicle to motivate low-wealth, underrepresented teenagers to succeed at school and beyond. About 70% of the students are African American or Hispanic. Students meet once a month on a Saturday for ten months for an all-day retreat that harnesses the power of dramatic, creative, and visual arts as a means of building a host of practical and lifeenhancing skills. Interwoven into the program is a community service component that encourages the belief in "giving back" to strengthen the social fabric of the community. Along with fine art and music activities, this year's students wrote life stories and poetry. The following poem comes from a student named Eric:

> The sorrow engulfed me like a snake The great constrictor had me in his unbearable grip Everyday his grip got stronger and stronger *Trapped, can't move, can barely breathe* All I can do is sit here Brace the pain *Hope for it to be over* Mv vision blurs All I see is the snakes now About to put me out of my misery Then the snake weakens I can move, breathe Help has arrived To remove the snake from my life *He isn't gone yet* But he doesn't have the hold on me He once had *Now day by day he weakens as I grow stronger* The prey has become the survivor

The Congregational Meeting held on April 6, 2014 featured reports on church finances, the 12-month canvass initiative, the ongoing ministerial survey, recently completed church facilities improvements, ongoing development of the Religious Exploration proposal, and the recognition of Shining Lights.

Actions included the election of the slate of 2014-2015 officers and trustees and as well as members of the nominating and endowment committees. The church also voted to approve "spending up to \$450,000 of capital campaign funds for the construction of a geothermal heating and cooling system for the main building".

The church voted to adopt the slate presented by Jan Bird, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee, as follows:

Board of Trustees -President: John Woolums; Vice President: Michael Willis; Finance Officer: Annie Thornton; Secretary: Larry Werner; and At-Large Members: Linda Rhoades. (*Continuing At-Large Members: Charles Gross and Alethea Shiplett*)

Nominating Committee -New Members: Marlene Browne, Tiffany Hipszer, Tony Hipszer (*Continuing Members: Jan Bird (Chair); Kari Bichell, Jodi Delaney, Heather Millar, Dianne Moreau, and Darrell Nash*)

Endowment Committee -New Members: Robert Ertman, Phyllis Marsh (*Continuing Members: Janette Gearing, Jackie Heimbuch, Irene Jordan, Jan Lucie, Al Pulsifer, and Dick Roop*)

Following the election, John Woolums thanked the outgoing Board Secretary Bryan Barrett, and committee members Louise Huddleston and Stuart Bailey, for their service.

Rev. Muir presented the finance report, on behalf of Annie Thornton. The report highlighted the positive performance of pledge receipts in the first quarter, the growth of the operating reserve fund, and described the 12-month canvass initiative as promising so far. Rev. Muir encouraged members to participate promptly when contacted by the canvass team.

Rev. Christina Leone Tracy discussed her "RE for all Ages" proposal, in which RE would be held at 10:00 AM. Rev. Christina emphasized that she sees this as a great opportunity to enhance youth and adult RE services, but that no decision has been made, several open discussions have been scheduled, and any inputs or suggestions are welcomed. Rev. Muir thanked the Building Committee for all their work. He indicated that the foundation work is completed, and that we are close to a final geothermal contract. The congregation engaged in a lengthy, lively, and respectful question and answer period, followed by the vote to overwhelmingly approve the necessary expenditure of capital funds to install the geothermal heating and cooling system.

In recognition of their great work and contribution to UUCA, Shining Lights Awards for 2014 were made to Jacque Pulsifer, Al Pulsifer, Marlene Browne, and Mickey Lund.

The congregation is once again indebted to the dedicated service of the Congregational Meetings Committee, especially Win Decker and Diane Goforth, who moderated the meeting.



Affirmation for Children Ages 6-8 May 17-18

Each year in the springtime, our Coming of Age (8th grade) youth embark on their annual pilgrimage to Boston. The trip and their follow-up worship service are the highlights of the COA year. By completing COA, the congregation recognizes that the kids have passed a milestone in their faith development and are now "responsible youth".

Another age of transition and growth, that UUs often overlook, is the age around 2nd grade, or about 6-8 years old. This is the time when children begin the first steps in taking responsibility for one's own faith... the age of "Accountability". This is often the age of the First Communion in the Catholic Church, the age of Baptism in the LDS Church, and the age when children receive a first Torah in some Jewish Synagogues.

At the Unitarian Universalist Church of Annapolis, we recognize that there are stages in faith development, and we want to highlight and celebrate those stages communally.



We Are Too Open-Minded!—Claude AnShin Thomas

Did that grab UU readers? What AnShin actually said in his opening call to mindfulness was that "We are too open-minded to what our brains are telling us and closed-minded to reality." Attendance at the four events from Thursday, April 10, through Sunday, April 13, with AnShin and Wiebke KenShin Andersen totaled over 140 seats, although UUCA's Mindfulness Practice Group did not track how many of those were repeats. Maryland attendees came from St. Mary's County through Carroll County, and others were from as far away as southern West Virginia.

AnShin and KenShin offered Zen Order of Interbeing approachability and addressed western concerns like stress. That's not surprising, since AnShin was initially converted to Buddhism by Thich Nhat Hanh and spent years in residence at Plum Village. Those westernized elements were uniquely combined with AnShin's core message from within the Zen Peacemakers, the Soto Zen order which ordained him: the necessity of a Disciplined Spiritual Practice. AnShin emphasized at all events that his priestly robe, his creation of altars, and his shaved head were not constraints but powerful girders supporting mindfulness, the living presence of eighty-one generations of Soto dharma teachers enveloping him. "The altar is my body and mind integrated," he said, explaining why his altar elements are always present at the scheduled events and carefully tended. Three dozen people at a previously unannounced appearance in the Emerson Room on Sunday, April 13, met the highly-instructive "Buddha Pillow," a nondescript UUCA cushion drafted to sit on the center of the table at the front of that room, making it an altar, reminding us that our own Buddha-natures were always present to rest in.

The initial talk on Thursday, April 10, was the largest session with fifty people. At that and subsequent events, the Mindfulness Practice Group was able to generate interest in UUism, although the table displays in the entrance to the church helped too in provoking questions (answered only after Noble Silence!). We were able to tell many of the forty people who attended the public retreat on Saturday, April 12, about the fairly new sitting group at First Unitarian Church in Baltimore, and several were interested in that option. AnShin's farewell message at the retreat told people to see Bob Ertman to find out more about UUCA and

other UU opportunities. AnShin and KenShin's interest in UUism was further developed the next day, Sunday, by Rev. John's sermon which featured such topics of mutual interest as relative and absolute truth and impermanence. AnShin emphasized these connections in his subsequent remarks in the Emerson Room.

Both the Friday retreat for veterans and families only and the public retreat on Saturday featured oral directions and offered reasons for these practices which are rarely spelled out in Soto Zen, which eschews words and concepts. This was a unique opportunity to hear highly disciplined Soto practices explained rather than depending on modeling. Both retreats incorporated the Soto feature of Work Practice. KenShin told us that Soto Zen required "leaving no traces," but that the forty in attendance Saturday ought to be able to leave UUCA's building and grounds better than they had found them. KenShin beamed with joy on Sunday when Susan Eckert commented on how "absolutely spotless" everything was. Both retreats also featured Zen Order of Interbeing-based, small-group Deep Listening practices. Listeners were not allowed to influence others' narratives by oral acknowledgement, touching, or even offering a Kleenex. Many commented at the closing ceremony on how they were stunned at the depth of sharing drawn out by the practice.

Too many people to list helped materially with these events. The Mindfulness Practice Group especially thanks Mark Chapin from the West Annapolis Vets' Center; he's a vet, LSW, and wise man. Sangha-friend UUCA members included: Sarah Conway who so beautifully designed the flyer and poster and served as ino, maintainer of order in the meditation hall for the public retreat; Lois Fussell who set

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up, broke down, supplied tea, and made emergency shopping trips; and John Nikata, new member in both church and sangha, who was the first to arrive for everything and last to leave, setting up, breaking down, heavy lifting of trash and cushions, astutely chosen by AnShin to serve as both *chiden*, altar attendant for both retreats, and as his right-hand man through Sunday.

AnShin shared a new vision with us. As an itinerant monk walking (over 45,000 miles) and homeless, he has never acquired property let alone built anything. Now he aspires to have a center for veterans where PTSD will be

treated as a spiritual injury. SECOND SUNDAY OUTREACH COLLECTION

The April Second Sunday Outreach Collection totaled \$884.00 to benefit the Light House, a homeless prevention center located in Annapolis. The mission of the Light House is to rebuild lives by providing shelter and services to help people transition toward self-sufficiency. The Light House provides temporary housing for 45 single clients (30 men, 15 women), and it has 4 apartments for families.

The Light House also offers job training in culinary arts, retail management, and facilities management through its on-site B.E.S.T. program, as well as GED and parenting classes.

There are many volunteer opportunities available. UUCA provides dinners on the second Saturday of each month, as well as bag lunches. Every March, we stock the pantry—see the article on page of this Highlights edition about this years' collection.
