Board Workshop

The Board of Trustees held a workshop on June 7, facilitated by Patrick Lee. Patrick is a UUCA member and professional strategic planning consultant. The Board greatly appreciates his contribution of time and expertise. Our focus was to create a better understanding of church governance and responsibilities within UUCA. In preparation for the workshop, the Board was asked to read the book *Who's In Charge Here? The Complex Relationship Between Ministry and Authority*. This book was prepared by the Commission on Appraisal of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations (UUA) in 2013. We worked on defining the differences between management and leadership, and provided examples of good managers and good leaders from our own experiences. We matched those traits to different roles within UUCA. We created a list of Board responsibilities and discussed that list in the light of policy governance. We brainstormed a list of challenges affecting UUCA, also in the light of policy governance, to help clarify roles and responsibilities as well as prioritization.

The workshop was a good step in the direction of creating a cohesive and interconnected plan to address the future path of UUCA. The Board's responsibility is to ensure UUCA continues to travel in the direction set by its members. Your voice and active involvement in the church are important. UUCA is an important part of all our lives and we are anxious to hear from congregants about your views of our current and future direction. To communicate directly with the Board, you can email board@uuannapolis.org. Any message sent to this address will go to the Board Secretary and then be shared with the entire Board. If email is not your thing, you can always stick a note on the Board corkboard, right next to the nametags in the narthex. These messages will also be shared with the Board at our next meeting. We will do our best to respond as expeditiously as possible.

June 12 Board Meeting

The Board workshop was deemed a success. We continue to define the roles and responsibilities of the Board and its members as they relate to policy governance. We agreed to change the agenda for Board meetings to place a primary focus on reviewing and defining end statements during the meetings and conduct more coordination and other business between meetings. The August Board meeting will be moved to the $21^{\rm st}$ due to scheduling conflicts. We decided that the two (open) Congregational Board meetings will be held on **September 21** and **November 23**. These meetings will provide those in attendance an opportunity to view the Board in action, and see how it functions.

Do you know who Henry Bergh is?

He's the man who started the SPCA, and he was a Unitarian! His 201st birthday would fall on August 29, and we're celebrating a few days early with our first Animal Blessing Sunday in several years!

What's an Animal Blessing?

Animal Blessings are traditional Unitarian
Universalist services to honor the animal companions in our lives –
living and no longer with us – by inviting them to be a part of our
service! Pets can be brought to the church to be blessed "in person"
(Pets are people too!) or you can bring a picture.

Will we honor deceased pets?

Photos or objects to remember pets who have "crossed the rainbow bridge" (passed away) are welcome for our Rainbow Bridge Altar in the memorial garden.

Where should I bring my pet?

Friendly animals can be brought in fishbowls, crates, harnesses, or terrariums. Bring your pet to church, downstairs, to be "pet-sat" during our short all-ages worship service in the sanctuary.

Dogs – Angebranndt Room/Wright Room (big and small dogs, respectively)

Cats - R.E. Sanctuary

Reptiles – Children's Library (inside RE Sanctuary) Small Animals (hamsters...) – Beginner R.E. Classroom

(inside RE Sanctuary)

What's happening that morning?

The service will be short – 30 minutes or so – and is for all ages. Nursery care will be available, but otherwise children and youth will attend with families. After the short interactive service, we'll head down to pick up animals from their pet-sitters, and then to the memorial garden for the ministers to lay hands on, and bless, your beloved animal friends.

UU Rev/Zen Roshi James
Ford grounded his talk "A
Meditation on the First &
Seventh Principles of Unitarian
Universalism" at 2014's General
Assembly in his resonance with
Rev. John's homily at GA in
2012. The AWAKE service he'd
just attended this year at GA
renewed this source of
inspiration, he noted. In 2012,
Roshi Ford had recognized his
own UU Buddhist, non-dual
orientation articulated in Rev.
John's claim:

I am a First and Seventh Principle preacher. I heard those words, and I heard my own heart, my voice, and my life... The First is our proclamation of the preciousness of the human being, of each and every one of us, as we are. You are good enough.... 'We affirm and promote the dignity and worth of every person.' And the Seventh Principle grounds and radicalizes it by proclaiming that this is so because we are all of us...united in a web of intimacy... 'We affirm and promote the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part.'

Roshi Ford was addressing an overflowing room designed for about 120, but with people sitting in the aisles, standing in the rear, and stretching out into the hallway. He opened with the understated, "I've heard that the larger UUA is having some trouble with membership"; a

reference to a couple of short items in the Washington Post noting that Buddhism appeared to be the only active growth point for UUism. Looking at the First and Seventh Principles, he noted their perfect fit with Buddhist insistence on non-duality-- in the case of the Principles: individual and society, rights and preserving communities, the human organism and all the others of the biosphere. As he noted again at the end, "Not either/or -both/and!" "With it a New Universalism has been proclaimed!" he said, referring to the framing of rest of the Principles by these two items. The only theological source he explicitly cited for his own stance, besides Rev. John, was the great Zen master Robert Aitken; "Unpack the tendency to coalesce and you get intimacy. Unpack intimacy and you will find that you contain all beings." Roshi Ford summarized by quoting the theme of this year's GA: Love Reaching Out. Near the end of the half-hour of questions, one person at the mic said, "I don't actually have a question. I just want to say that this is only event I have attended at the GA so far [fourth full day] at which someone actually discussed theology. Um, that was a compliment."

Roshi Ford halted at a question on love and attachment to call on his colleague at the front table, Rev. Samuel Trumbore, who had opened the session by explaining that the UU Buddhist Fellowship was nonsectarian and the only group (as opposed to single event) in which practitioners of all different Buddhist paths and of other contemplative traditions, including Christians, all sat together with no distinctions, a practice of which UUCA's Mindfulness Practice Group is especially proud. Roshi Ford noted that love was not a central issue in Zen literature or liturgy, so he would call up a "love specialist" from the Theravadan tradition in which metta, lovingkindness, is a frequent focus. Rev. Trumbore answered the question by taking it back to daily spiritual practices. Meditation, he said, both brought him the peace in which he could find his original state as love and opened a space in which he had time to recall his experience of that original state and to respond from that. Rev. Trumbore wrapped up the event by stating that "The UU Buddhist Fellowship wants to go where you want it to go," and people could come up to the table at the front to see samples of *The UU Sangha*, edited by Bob Ertman, and fill out a form to join. It was remarkable that NO ONE had left at the end of Roshi Ford's remarks, and only a couple, literally, left during the questions. Even at the end of the session dozens of people instantly surrounded Roshi Ford and another couple of dozen lined up at the front table to join the UUBF, a reluctance to break up and leave the room I'd never before seen at GA.




<u>August 19:</u> Transformative Power of Listening

We all know that listening is an important skill but how often do you practice listening as a spiritual practice? Experience the power of listening to transform your relationships.



In June, I went to General Assembly (GA) for the first time. Pulling into Providence, RI, I didn't know what to expect. I had written down all the info I needed to know so Michael [Willis] and I would be ready to carry the UUCA banner in the opening ceremonies. I wasn't ready for the thousands of people in the arena and the hundreds of beautiful banners from UU Churches all over the country. What an honor to represent our church!

For the next five days, I went to workshops and attended worship services. Immediately I noticed the important part that music played ... Lots of music - intergenerational choirs and groups; bands; interesting arrangements of familiar hymns, and jazzy arrangements of old hymns. I was most impressed with how every service began - people singing a medley of hymns, then moving right into the chalice lighting as the music quieted. There were children and teenagers singing and clapping as they helped lead the music. The words projected on the screens allowed everyone to be free to participate. Wow! ...and, all ideas we can utilize here at **UUCA!**

The workshops also got me thinking, and I came away with lots of thoughts and ideas:

*We tend to critique contemporary services...but why? There's no right or wrong. All services can be made rich and

SECOND SUNDAY OUTREACH COLLECTION

The July Second Sunday Outreach Collection totaled \$1,144.05 to benefit *We Care & Friends*. In addition, \$150 of this collection will support UUCA's participation in the Eastport Community Center Project, which enriches the lives of children living in public housing.

We Care & Friends is the pay-it-forward life work of community member Larry Griffin. Programs fall into four main categories: access to substance abuse treatment; homeless programs; at-risk youth programs; and other community programs. Examples of these include a lunch program that provides 350 bagged lunches per week; School On the Water, which offers free summer activities for up to 35 Annapolis-area children between the ages of 7-15 years old; Thanksgiving dinner for the homeless, which feeds approximately 3,000 people; and treatment for about 52 people per year seeking help for substance abuse. rewarding. Sacred is not about genre, but happens when we work together and we're intentional in the balance between words and music. Music is a tool that can take us to a deeper place.

*Music is dominant for growth in church and we can expand it to include many backgrounds.

*How do you feel after worship service? How have you added to the worship experience? Rather than a consumer attitude of "what can you do for me", come with an attitude of contributing and really showing up.

*We try so hard to get worship "right" and we tend to stay in our heads. Come from the heart and people will go away feeling "a part of".

*What makes you comfortable might make someone else feel uncomfortable. We need to grow in diversity and expand our circle.

*The more comfortable you are in dominant society, the less comfortable you are with change.

*"Art washes from the soul the dust of everyday life" (Picasso). Art and music in our churches are spiritual work. Art and music are sacred practices.

I will take these thoughts and experiences with me into the 2014-15 church year. Some new ideas: *Children's Choir* which practices during the 9:00 AM worship; sings once a month with the Spirit Choir and at the 5:00 PM Christmas Eve service. *Spirit Choir* will develop and sing a wide range of diverse music ("enlarging the circle"), and the youth will join them at times as well.


