
Are You Ready for the New Church Year?

There are lots of new happenings at UUCA this fall, so here are a few things you need to know about the new church year:

Ingathering Service and Potluck - Sunday, **September 7**, 10:00 AM Remember to bring your small vial of water, as Water Communion is a part of the Ingathering Service. We will also welcome our new Intern Minister, and bless the RE teachers for the coming year. After the service, please stay for the Potluck Picnic! We ask that everyone bring a dish according to their last name:


A-G: dessert; **H-M**: green/fruit salad; **N-Z**: main dish

We **return to 2 services** on Sunday, **September 14**. Please note that the first service begins promptly at *9:00 AM*, and the second service begins promptly at *11:15 AM*. Nursery care is offered during both services; children and youth should all join their families in the sanctuary. Children ages 4-10 will then be sung out to participate in child care, if they wish.



September 14 is also the start of *Middle Hour*, at **10:10 AM**. At that time we will be offering RE for all ages! Children and youth will attend their classes as usual (and parents will be receiving a separate letter with more details!), and we will offer classes for adults too! Adults can choose to mingle for Coffee Hour, or there will be other offerings such as: a "Going Deeper" discussion of the sermon/worship topic in the RE sanctuary; "Music as a Spiritual Practice" in the main sanctuary; "Chair Yoga" with Dick Roop; and many other topics which will vary throughout the year. *To find out what's happening each Sunday*, there will be a magnetic board inside the front entrance and another inside the RE entrance - check those for rooms and topics.

General Assembly from a Board Member's Perspective...

This year I attended General Assembly in Providence, R.I., as a delegate of our church and as a UUCA board member. It was my first General Assembly (GA) and it lived up to all my expectations; an exhilarating experience sharing spiritual enrichment as well as educational workshops with UU's from around the country. I attended sessions at which delegates voted on governance issues of the UUA, a variety of services where UU's offered an experience of different contemporary services, the WARE lecture given this year by Sister Simone Campbell, and workshops focused primarily on various issues/ concerns related to governance within the UUA itself and churches within the association. Our church was also well represented by it's ministers and I was present at the AWAKE service and workshop, and a grand "bridging service" at which Rev. Christina had a primary role. Too much to share in these brief comments. However, since my focus was on governance, I did come away with a number of observations and thoughts relevant to UUCA. The governance of our church is a "policy governance" model, as is the UUA, so I felt I was able to learn from the worships offered by the UUA Board. One issue the UUA Board is grabbling with is accessibility to GA. It is pretty expensive to attend, and the UUA Board recognizes how this fact alone restricts who is able to come. A number of things are being considered as attempts to address this problem. I'm hoping that our church can also make some changes that will broaden the pool of congregants who might be able to represent us as delegates at future General Assemblies, as well as be more broadly representative of our congregation.

<u>September 2</u>: *Umoja Means Unity* - We will find inspiration in the Swahili word *umoja*. Let's experience how unity can take many forms and transform


September 9: Allies as Unifiers - How can you support a group of people if you don't belong to that community? We will explore the spiritual side of being an ally.

Summer RE - An Experiment, and a Success!

This summer was the first year we have offered R.E. for all children and youth, rather than a limited program for only young kids. The preschool through rising-second graders have been doing a UUA curriculum entitled "Creating Home." The rising third-fifth graders worked on the UU curriculum called "Windows and Mirrors." The rising 6th-8th graders have been exploring UU values through the lens of *the Hunger Games*. And, rising 9th-12th graders have been meeting as a youth group and engaging in discussion and activity. It has been wonderful to see an active R.E. program all summer.

In the past, R.E. summer Sunday attendance has only been about 5-15 children. This summer we have averaged 26 children and youth per Sunday! Wow!

Camp Beagle's "Two-Hands Hero"

Each year, Camp Beagle honors a "Two Hands Hero" someone who serves as a role model for the values we celebrate at Camp Beagle: care for the natural environment, scientific inquiry, respect, diversity, etc.

These two people have been excellent models of perseverance and diversity -- Geoff Roehm is a UUCA members and long-time Camp Beagle volunteer and he has persevered in his life in spite of an early childhood brain injury. Ethan Sprinkle is a child who has been a part of the UUCA community since he was very young. Last year he was diagnosed with brain cancer and has been bravely undergoing treatment and doing well throughout. Geoff, and Ethan and his family help us remember the diversity in health and physical abilities in our community, and how beautiful it is when each person brings their unique gifts and strengths to support each other.

\$151,373 Garden Grant for Watershed Stewardship

For the last three years, several people have worked hard to obtain grants to help offset the costs of improving UUCA's watershed stewardship and rainwater management. Rainwater has led to the erosion of our walkways (most notably the walkway to the Memorial Garden) and the erosion of root structures that has led to trees falling near or on our building. Rev. Christina Leone Tracy has worked with volunteers including Sarah Scott, Stephanie Sprinkle, Pat Fleeharty, Larissa and Rob Hannon, and Megan and Dave Sabat on the project that would remedy our water issues and ultimately lead to our being able to build a new playscape in the children's yard--one that wouldn't rot away due to ponding water. Almost three years ago, UUCA contracted with EcoGardens, LLC, led by Mel Wilkins, to develop a comprehensive plan and write applications for grants. You might remember the EcoGoats who spent a couple days on our property, eating away our shrubs and ivy so that a Landscape Architect, Chris Moore, could see the curvature of the landscape and draw accurate plans. Several grants were submitted, but only one resulted in any funding: a \$1000 grant from Unity Gardens which paid for several new plantings on the property.

It seemed that the project was at a standstill, and there was no money in sight for the over \$150K needed to massively overhaul the stormwater management of the UUCA property. Pat Fleeharty

volunteered to continue submitting grant applications, and he found one through the Watershed Stewards Academy offering grants for between \$20-60K. He applied, and recently we were informed that we have been accepted and fully funded for the total amount of our needs: \$151,373 to implement our entire plan as created by Mel and Chris. WOW! Thank you to Pat for persevering in this effort. This program is a new endeavor between the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay, Watershed Stewards



Academy, the Interfaith Alliance for the Chesapeake, called "Riverwise Congregations," and it targets houses of worship to target watershed stewardship at a grassroots level. Because we are one of the first



congregations on board with this program, they chose to award us a grant to meet the entirety of our need, rather than their originally-stated cap of \$60K.

In return for the funds and support from their team of experts, who will contract with construction and landscape experts (we won't be digging with pickaxes this time!), UUCA has provided two new candidates for the Anne Arundel County · Watershed Stewards Academy Watershed Stewardship Academy to enroll in the "Master Watershed

Steward" program and undertake a "capstone project" including providing educational and volunteer project coordination here at UUCA. The two candidates who have accepted

the challenge are: Win Decker and Jamie Gilmore. Without Win and Jamie, this grant would be hypothetical rather than real! We look forward to working with Jamie and Win, and the experts from the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay, to improve the watershed stewardship at UUCA.

Endowment Grants - - Summer 2014

In July, the Endowment Board approved three additional projects for funding. The amount committed totaled \$6,000. This brings to nine the number of projects supported in 2014 with the total funding being \$29,992.

The projects approved were:

SPAN, Inc. Recovery House Assistance Project - *\$1500*. Funding provided to assist individuals entering into a recovery house program with the first week's rent or to assist with eviction prevention. SPAN works closely with the recovery houses to provide individuals with the opportunity to be in a supportive environment so as to overcome their addiction problem, and to keep them from being homeless.

Grocery Reimbursement Fund for UUCA Light House Volunteers - \$1000. Volunteers from UUCA cook dinner at the Light House shelter on the second Saturday of every month. Money will be used to reimburse church members for groceries when groups or individuals cannot afford to pay for them but are willing to do the work to plan, prepare, and serve the meal. Newtowne Community Development Corporation, Support for Homework Haven - \$3500.

Funds to operate Homework Haven, an after school program which serves approximately 25 elementary school students from Woodside Gardens. Homework Haven meets 5 days per week from 3:00 to 5:00 PM, and provides a safe place where students can complete their homework, read, and play games under adult supervision. (Darrel Nash)
