AWAKE Ministries - New Worship Day & Time!

—Dayna Edwards; Rev. John Crestwell In March of 2013, UUCA supported and launched a cutting-edge new worship format through its AWAKE Ministry. AWAKE's worship service was developed to speak to an audience that might not be interested in attending traditional Sunday morning services. And so, for over 18-months, a multigenerational and multicultural crowd worshiped together on Tuesday nights.

While immensely popular with a core group of members, during formal discussion with AWAKE stakeholders, the consensus was that AWAKE Ministries would be accessible to more people if worship was held on a different day of the week. After even more discussion, the decision was made to move AWAKE from Tuesday to Sunday, with potluck at 4:00 PM and worship from 4:30-6:00 PM.

All of the aspects of AWAKE that you've come to love will remain the same, and we're adding more! Contemporary music with a soulful flair, life-coaching, short video clips, and the "Wheel of Wisdom" already differentiate the AWAKE Ministries service from all others. Starting in November, there will be even more variety in the styles of music played, to include folk music, international music, pop, and jazz music, performed by musicians who are members and non-members.

There will also be more activities for children ages 3 to 8 with a once-per-month "kid's coach time" by Alethea Shiplett, offered in the RE Sanctuary. Children age nine and over are invited to remain in the service the entire time to participate fully in this engaging worship style. Anyone who has attended an AWAKE service can tell you, there is a certain vibrant and transformative energy that surrounds the AWAKE community during worship.

AWAKE Ministries leans into the first UU principle: The inherent worth and dignity of every human being. AWAKE is also designed to specifically work with the UUCA global ends statement: *to create the Beloved Community by inspiring and empowering all souls to live bold and compassionate lives.* In the spirit of boldness, we embrace people that enjoy using their whole body in worship. Singing, dancing, clapping, swaying are all explicitly encouraged at our casual services. In the spirit of compassion, we intentionally create an atmosphere where Christians, Jews, Buddhists, and others can worship together. If you want to meet and have a meaningful conversation with someone who comes from a different life/spiritual path than you, AWAKE is the worship community for you.

Finance Officer Search Underway

Our current Finance Officer (FO), Annie Thornton, will be wrapping up her three-year term this May. So, it's time to start gearing up to choose the next FO. This is a part-time, volunteer leadership position where the FO serves as an officer on the Board of Trustees. The selected individual should be comfortable working with numbers but does not need to have an accounting background.

Annie's advice is:

If you are used to project management, department or business management, or other forms of monitoring progress towards financial goals, you probably have the right background for this leadership role. By "paying attention" to the big picture and highlighting questions to be addressed, you can have a big




impact on the financial success of our church. This is a great opportunity to work with the church leadership, both the Board of Trustees and Rev. Fred and his team. A side benefit - one of my favorites - is that you also are part of the Endowment Grant process to help select the year's social justice initiatives.

You will not be "hanging out there by yourself" in this role - you will have much support. We have a bookkeeper who does the accounting legwork and creates the monthly spreadsheets. We have our Administrator, Susan Eckert, who manages the budgeting process and tracks the details. Rev. Fred provides the overall leadership on financial processes. A former FO, Jackie Heimbuch, brings accounting expertise from her career CFO background.

The FO is also supported by a strong Finance Committee, made up of several committed people who I consider "my finance family":

- Louise Huddleston, former treasurer and very experienced in church finances


<u>November 23</u>: Individual in Community -

A Pilgrimage to Transylvania!

When you hear "Transylvania" what do you think? If your first answer is Dracula, then read on!

Transylvania was once an independent nation, later became subsumed into Hungary, and is now a part of Romania. It is also the ancestral home of Unitarian Christianity, a predecessor to modern English and American Unitarian Christianity, which is a predecessor to modern Unitarian Universalism. Unitarian churches still exist in Transylvania, and our congregation, UUCA, has two partner congregations in Romania—one in an area called Almas, and the other in Rava. Visit our church library for pictures, artifacts, and gifts from our partner churches in Romania.

Every few years we work to bring the ministers from our partner churches to us in the U.S., or to make a pilgrimage to visit them in their country. This summer, we hope to send a delegation from UUCA to visit our partners and strengthen our relationships with the wonderful people there who share our faith (albeit in a different form).

This trip is open to ALL members and friends of UUCA, and *I am extending a special welcome to YRUU (high school age) youth with or without parents.* There will be adult chaperones and we will work with youth to ensure a positive, safe, and life-changing trip to broaden their worldview and deepen their faith roots.

I have been working with John Dale, travel coordinator at the UU Partner Church Council to organize this trip. Here is the general information:

-Likely travel dates are Sunday July 26-Friday August 7 (DCA airport)

- -We will spend most of the ten-day trip in Transylvania, visiting important UU heritage sites and spending five days with our two partner churches
- -We will sleep in hotels and a Unitarian dorm. Accommodations will be rustic but will include beds, indoor plumbing, and electricity
- -There is an added 2.5-day trip at the end to Budapest for a taste of a larger more modern European city.
- -The estimated cost of the trip, including flights, room, and most meals, is \$2,800. Some members could possibly omit the Budapest leg of the trip, reducing cost by about \$500 and trip length by 2.5 days.

Proposed Change to By-Laws—Vote in December

On December 7, at the Congregational Meeting, the congregation will be asked to approve a change to the by-laws in support of the addition of an Operating Reserve Fund.

The proposed Operating Reserve Fund will consist of funds that have been set aside for use only in cases of financial emergencies. There will be transparency in how the funds will be used, with an annual reporting on the Operating Reserve Fund status. Having this Operating Reserve Fund in place will provide a financial buffer to bolster the ongoing management of cash flow and monthly bill paying. For example, if there is a cash flow problem during the slower summer months, this fund can be temporarily "tapped" and then replenished when pledged income picks up again in the fall.

Here is the proposed wording change to the by-laws:

Addition to the second paragraph under the Finance Officer section (By-Law III-Finance. 1.): The Finance Officer will track the Operating Reserve Fund, targeted to be between ten and fifteen percent of the current year's operating budget expense. Use of the Operating Reserve Fund will be directed by the Senior Minister and will be limited to addressing financial emergencies where the operating income is not sufficient to meet existing expenses. The Senior Minister will notify the Board of Trustees of any use of the Operating Reserve Fund. The Finance Officer shall report to the Congregation at the Annual Meeting on the status of the Operating Reserve Fund and on the activities and disbursements during the current year.

Good news! If the change is approved, there are two hugely generous donors who will provide a significant start to the Operating Reserve Fund. With their help, we can begin January with about \$30,000 in the fund – taking our average four week cash flow reserve of \$60,000 and improving it to a six week window. Endowment Grants-Summer 2014

In July, the Endowment Board approved three additional projects for funding. The amount committed totaled \$6,000. This brings to nine the number of projects supported in 2014 with the total fund-ing being \$29,992.

The projects approved were:

• *SPAN, Inc. Recovery House Assistance Project*, **\$1500**. Funding provided to assist individuals entering into a recovery house program with the first week's rent or to assist with eviction prevention. SPAN works closely with the recovery houses to provide individuals with the opportunity to be in a supportive environment so as to overcome their addiction problem, and to keep them from being homeless.

• *Grocery Reimbursement Fund for UUCA Light House Dinners (Carrie Kotcho),* **\$1000**. Volunteers from UUCA cook dinner at the Light House on the second Saturday of every month. Money will be used to reimburse church members for groceries when groups or individuals cannot afford to pay for them but are willing to do the work to plan, prepare, and serve the meal.

• *Newtowne Community Development Corporation (Darrel Nash), Support for Homework Haven,* \$3500. Funds to operate Homework Haven, an after school program which serves approximately 25 elementary school students from Woodside Gardens. Homework Haven meets 5 days per week for 2 hours, and provides a safe place where students can complete their homework, read, and play games under adult supervision.
