Dear White Allies - -

—an excerpt from Rev. John's January 10 blog article

I must confess that over the last few years I have been gravely disappointed with the white moderate. I have almost reached the regrettable conclusion that the Negro's great stumbling block in the stride toward freedom is not the White Citizen's Council-er or the Ku Klux Klanner, but the white moderate who is more devoted to "order" than to justice; who prefers a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice; who constantly says "I agree with you in the goal you seek, but I can't agree with your methods of direct action;" who paternalistically feels he can set the timetable for another man's freedom; who lives by the myth of time and who constantly advises the Negro to wait until a 'more convenient season.' Shallow understanding from people of goodwill is more frustrating than absolute misunderstanding from people of ill will. Lukewarm acceptance is much more bewildering than outright rejection.

[Martin Luther King, Jr; Letter from Birmingham Jail, 1963]

Most people I know want simple fairness in life. They want a job and a decent wage doing something meaningful; to have a family; to live in safe and quality housing; to be able to educate their kids in safe, quality schools with the hope that they will become well-rounded individuals. And, many of us wish to find love (with whomever we want), and success (in whatever field of study we choose). Pretty simple stuff.

Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "ask" from society for African-Americans was simple, but the response from the white masses was complex – full of hate and fear. Blacks wanted full integration into the American way of life, not because of an insatiable need to imitate whiteness, but rather because of the human yearning to be free. All people want the opportunity to participate fully and fairly in a democracy.

Current poverty, unemployment, and incarceration rates; along with police arrest rates of minorities; show us that the simple freedoms many seek have not been fully realized. We are now over 50 years removed from the Civil Rights Movement and people are still angry, bitter, and yearning for freedom.

What can we do? As privileged people what can *you* do? What are you doing to help brown and black people attain their spiritual and physical freedoms that are still being denied by the white majority?

Preliminary 2014 Financial Results

Thank you to everyone who was able to attend the December Congregational Meeting (contact the church office if you would like access to the presentation). As promised, here is a brief update of the 2014 preliminary results. The final results will be summarized at the April Congregational Meeting after the formal year-end closing.

The year-end appeal was a great success, bringing in almost \$14,000 in donations! Thank you to our very generous UUCA congregation. With these donations, tight financial management, and December contributions, we are pretty much break-even for the year. This is a huge achievement given the bare-bones low budget and switch to a new canvass system!

I'd also like to especially thank Bill Curtis. We had a lively discussion at the December Congregational Meeting over whether we could afford to do a Cost of Living Adjustment for the full time staff after several years of no COLAs or raises (about \$8,000 in additional expense). Bill provided a targeted donation to cover that amount so that we could move forward and do the right thing for our people. Thank you Bill!

Intercultural Competency and Emotional Literacy at UUCA

Most of us don't frequently think about our own culture (usually because we don't have to!). For this reason, identifying our personal cultural values or beliefs may seem like a strange or even difficult task. Yet, before we can see and understand other cultures, we must first see and understand our own. Differences can create challenges, even conflict. Those challenges and conflicts can either invigorate or divide our congregation, as well as the families, institutions and communities in which we live. In an increasingly diverse world, broadening and deepening our understanding and skills is a critical part of living in right relationships and shaping the beloved community.

Becoming inter-culturally competent can support us on our journey. As we live and work in increasingly multicultural settings, our success depends more and more upon our willingness to engage, respond and move forward with each other.

There are several opportunities our congregation has to engage in the practice of intercultural competency (IC) and emotional literacy (EL). The EL/IC Practice Group, facilitated by Alethea Shiplett, Life Coach and Trainer for AWAKE Ministries, meets on the second Tuesday of the month at 6:30 PM in the library. The aim of this group is to support one another in practicing communication skills and language that promote compassion and connection in personal relationships and across cultures. During Middle Hour on the first Sunday of each month, a workshop on emotional literacy and intercultural competency will be offered as an introduction to the concepts and practice of non-violent communication. Finally, on the first weekend in May, guest facilitator Phyllis Braxton returns to lead an all-day workshop, *Embracing Our Multicultural Present and Future*. This workshop will give us practical tools to heighten our awareness to effectively manage and resolve conflicts between what is and what could be. Through the process of intercultural competence assessment and learning approaches for resolving conflict across cultures, we will gain a greater awareness to our congregation and our personal and professional interactions.

Please take advantage of these opportunities to learn and practice these skills of communicating for connection, so you can contribute to making UUCA a more compassionate and welcoming community.

The big game brings with it an array of diverse people, places and ideals to contemplate. Let's discuss what we can learn about diversity from sports.


February 8: Thrive in Diversity

Selma: Bold & Compassionate

On Saturday, January 10, Rev. John Crestwell led a film & lunch-discussion group of AWAKE/UUCA/ARC (Anti-Racism Council) and the tag-along Mindfulness Practice Group to a showing of Selma. The fifty attendees were about three quarters of the audience for the early matinee. Three dozen of us went on to lunch at TGIFriday's after the film, continuing fellowship and processing our emotions after such a confrontation with the legacy of racism.

Universal consensus at TGIFriday's recommends *Selma* as a triumph at keeping it both "deep and real" (Rev. John's terms) for both King's marital indiscretions and the death of four little girls in a church bombing. Rev. John noted that Dr. King was portrayed masterfully by actor David Oyelowo who "...embodied the man. His facial expressions, gestures, movement; (his) whole persona made me believe he was King. As one who has studied King I can say that I was impressed and in awe!" MPG sanghafriend, Greater Annapolis Interfaith Network activist, and friend from Eastport United Methodist, Lee Corse said, "So powerful, just-- powerful—thrilling." One UUCA member was embarrassed (but quickly reassured) that others had heard her in the Bathroom, where she had gone when brought to tears. Rev. John added, "The brutality of that time left me in tears and close to wailing aloud with pain."

Nonetheless, conversation at TGIFriday's was so supportive and hopeful that no one left between our arrival at 1:15 until after 4 PM. We dispersed only after a couple of people looked at their watches and realized that we had nearly talked past kick-off for the Ravens' playoff!

New Year, New Energy, New Determination Applied to Diversity!

The sixth annual Greater Annapolis Interfaith Network's New Year Eve Worship Service was energized by an increased emphasis on music and audience-participation as well as determination to increase diversity of both attendees and worship leaders. Over one hundred and seventy people came, most to both the pre-service concert at 6:30 PM and the service at 7:00, an increase of about twenty percent over last year. Our hosts were the Eastport United Methodist Church under the new leadership of Rev. Michelle Meija. The standing ovation of the evening went to the Daughters of Zion Liturgical Dancers from Mt. Zion United Methodist Church, making their first appearance at the service. Also new to the service this year, the AWAKE musicians offered an inspiring style of music during the opening concert and throughout the service. Max Ochs, an annual favorite of GAIN, carried on in a rhythmic, bluesy spirit which left most people convinced that everyone in the concert had been practicing together for weeks!

UU commitment to diversity of faiths and people throughout Annapolis was exemplified by UUCA member Liz Vanden Heuvel, cochair of GAIN along with Sandra Solomon, as well as Rev. John T. Crestwell, Jr., leading the AWAKE musicians, including UUCA's own Josh Long and JT Crestwell. "Cantors" from UUCA's Mindfulness Practice Group offered a compassion chant; which featured UUCA members Kristine Steinkoenig, Lois Fussell, Judy Krantz, Bob Ertman and Phyllis Culham.

UUs and others appreciated the great diversity of contributors including Quakers, Baha'i, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (and their "pioneer" hymn), Islam, Judaism, the Annapolis Spanish Seventh Day Adventist Church, and GLBTQ-friendly Evolve Spirituality; as well as Annapolis city itself, represented by Joe Budge, Annapolis Alderman and Officer 1st Class Joseph Ridley from the Annapolis Police Department. Attendees finally adjourned to a substantial reception, complete with black-eyed peas.

Notes from the Green Sanctuary Team – Stormwater Mitigation

This coming spring, be on the lookout for a lot of activity outdoors as we work toward dealing with storm runoff, utilizing grant money for this purpose. As you may remember, we were awarded a \$150,000 grant from the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay and the Anne Arundel Watershed Stewards Academy to make environmental improvements to our impervious surfaces to mitigate the damage from stormwater runoff entering the headwaters of Luce Creek behind our building. That runoff contains nutrients, pollutants, and sediment which flow into the creek, the Severn River, and, eventually, the Chesapeake Bay. By creating four additional rain gardens at various parts of the parking lot, expanding the current rain gardens, placing a cistern to collect rain water from the roof, replacing some concrete with pervious pavement, and building a step pool system in the ravine behind the Memorial Garden, we hope to reach our goal of diminishing stormwater runoff.

This grant is part of the River-Wise Congregations grants, In which 17 faith communities are taking action to stop polluted runoff from their properties. As a condition of our participation in the grant program, UUCA is providing two Watershed Steward Academy trainees for its current series of classes - Win Decker and Jamie Gilmore. We thank them for their participation!
