


From the UUCA LIBRARY

Book Review by Rusty Vaughan -

One of the challenges today in our increasingly multicultural world is to understand life through another's eyes and to come to see their experiences as they differ from ours. As a white male, I have lived in a white-only world thinking I was living among and understanding the black community. It was only a few years ago that I began peeling back the layers that revealed my prejudices. Only then did I come to understand that this peeling will likely continue for the rest of my life.

Several books have led to my growing understanding but one that I read recently made it instantly to my list of Best-Books-I-Have-Ever-Read. That book is *Mirror to America* by John Hope Franklin (1915-2009). When I closed the cover after reading the last page I felt I had lived my life with a new friend and mentor, Dr. Franklin. *Mirror to America* is his amazing autobiography.



This was an interesting book to me in several ways. I read a review from someone who did not finish the book because they said that Franklin's ego got in the way of their enjoyment of the book. Contrary to that in my opinion, his ego was his survival mechanism. His belief in himself is what helped him achieve incredible heights not only in his career but as a cited scholar, historian, author and professor. His career achievements are incredible for anyone but, reading this, one

can understand the difficulties he had to surpass to the best. He transcended all odds. John Hope Franklin saw his obstacles as well as anyone else of his race but he refused to empower those obstacles. He refused to acknowledge them thus he soared to such great heights while enduring adversity.

Recently I learned that Dr. Franklin was a friend of our UUCA member Jane Burns. I learned that my cousin, a minister at Duke, had known him. The path he traveled likely touched a lot of my friends yet I never knew of him until I read his book.

The UUCA Board of Trustees gathered for a Board retreat this summer. Our focus was to get to know one another (as most members are new to the Board) and to explore what is most important in our work on behalf of the congregation.

As a result, we decided that the focus of our work this summer is to create a covenant statement that would guide how we will work together in the coming term. We decided to meet twice a month for several months in order to take careful time and thought into the meaning and development of our Board covenant. This is what we created:

As members of the Board of Trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Annapolis, we covenant the following:

- to interact with honesty, authenticity and compassion;
- to assume positive intentions of one another;
- to learn to practice forward thinking and language;
- to release ownership of our ideas for discernment and ownership by the board as a whole;
- to model our relationships to reflect our vision of UUCA and our greater faith community;
- to keep the best interests of the congregation at heart and to carry out the trust placed in us as guardians of UUCA's mission and vision; and
- to hold ourselves accountable for our words and actions.

But we did not stop there! We agreed that it was critical to the functioning of the work we do and our interface with church staff that we develop a second covenant. We will meet with the members of our staff to develop a covenant between the Board and staff. In this way, we believe, we will create an environment of mutual respect and reciprocity between those charged with overseeing and carrying out the policies and work of our beloved faith community.

I love our church! And this is one of the reasons why...because of our intentional, careful and nurturing work done on behalf of the precious relationships we have here at UUCA.

BEEC Summer Update

The Building Expansion Exploratory Committee (BEEC) has spent the past month making great forward progress on the Capital Improvement project for the lower level and the elevator.

The following tasks are just some of our work this past month:

- discussing final plans with church staff for moving the administrator's office to the upstairs copy room area
- reviewing plans and design options with Murphy Dittenhafer (architectural firm)
- working on engineering and final choice of elevator
- meeting with contractors for bids
- writing contracts and scope-of-work documents for each contractor
- applying for county building permits to begin approved work
- finalizing committee approved contracts
- selecting furniture (with staff input)
- taking final measurements for painting, ceiling repairs and replacements, and new backing for all bulletin boards.

SHARE-THE-PLATE COLLECTION

The **June** Share-the-Plate raised a total of \$1,421.75 to benefit **We Care & Friends**, an Annapolis innercity center of activity for assistance, classes, community events, and counseling. The **July** collection, for our **International Partners**, will be reported in the next issue.

The Share-the-Plate recipient for **August** will be **Anne Arundel & Annapolis Scholarship Trust**, which



serves low-income, first-generation-to-college students with programs emphasizing mentoring, vocational exploration, college prep and planning, cholarship financial scholarships and career networking. Over 60 scholarships have been awarded to date (including one in UUCA's name), with a *graduation* rate of 70% -- more than six times that of first-generation-to-college students

according to Pell Research. Currently, there are seven Annapolis Trust students enrolled in college and two just graduated this May. This fall, seven students will be supported with financial assistance and mentoring. Since 2002, the Annapolis Trust has provided scholarships for over 23 high school students to attend Gordonstoun International summer camp in Scotland.






