Intern Minister Bio - Welcome, Hannah!

Hannah Roberts Villnave grew up in Racine, Wisconsin, where she was raised Unitarian Universalist at Olympia Brown UU Church. She was a church nerd from the very beginning and started serving on committees as soon as they would let her. While Hannah loved singing in the choir, her real passion was for religious education and formation. She started teaching Sunday school when she was in the 8th grade, and hasn't really stopped since.

When Hannah moved to Tempe, Arizona to attend Arizona State University, she joined the UU Congregation of Phoenix. While in Arizona, Hannah went to church (almost) every Sunday, continued to teach Sunday school, and participated in the congregation's efforts to protest the passage of the SB 1070 bill criminalizing undocumented immigrants.

After graduating from Arizona State, Hannah moved to Baltimore, MD where she taught English to Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) at two Baltimore City middle schools. Most of her students were recently arrived refugees, primarily from Nepal and East Africa. Hannah's time as a teacher strengthened her commitment to the UU faith. In the midst of the organized chaos of her classroom, she discerned a call to ministry with the help of her new church family at the First Unitarian Church of Baltimore.

Hannah's belief in Unitarian Universalism's capacity to transform lives and communities led her to Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, DC, where she began as a Masters of Divinity student in 2013. As an Urban Ministry Fellow at Wesley, Hannah is committed to engaging with cities as theological texts. She truly loves cities of all sizes and is passionate about making them places that foster justice, equity, and compassion.

Hannah has also served the larger UU movement in volunteer leadership positions at General Assembly and by co-writing a Renaissance Module curriculum about UU Identity.

Hannah and her wife, Catherine, will be living at 1920 N. Lawrence with their cat, Schweinsteiger. Catherine will be continuing her work as the Science Enrichment Specialist for Baltimore City Public Schools. They love biking, doing crossword puzzles, and cheering on the Orioles. After four years of living just up 97 in Charm City, they are looking forward to getting to know Annapolis even better.



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Embracing Racial & Cultural Differences Committee and "Black Lives Matter"

In 2012, UUCA adopted a bylaw committing us to become an antiracist, anti-oppressive and multicultural congregation. In February of this year, UUCA held a social justice workshop; four task forces were created, including Embracing Racial and Cultural Differences (ERCD). In May, Phyllis Braxton guided the congregation in becoming interculturally competent. In June, the GA called upon member congregations to support the *Black Lives Matter* Movement as an Action of Immediate Witness. In July a summit of folks from area UU churches gathered to share their progress. Our ERCD committee agreed that putting up a Black Lives Matter banner would be an action of solidarity, both with the African American community and the River Road church, whose sign was vandalized twice, with someone cutting out the word "black." Rev. Fred Muir and the ministry team supported the ERCD's request to place the sign on church property, and our Board of Trustees endorsed this action.

On Sunday, August 16, Revs Christina and Patricia helped us launch the project. We are now wearing "Ask me about Black Lives Matter" labels on our nametags. On August 30, the "Black Lives Matter" banner will be ceremoniously installed on UUCA property. We are planning follow-up opportunities to involve everyone in this intentional learning space with us. We are also exploring how we can help efforts already underway in our local African American community and by other churches.

The UUCA Board really hit the ground running this spring. Shortly after the congregational meeting in April, there were one-on-one sessions with outgoing and incoming Board members to help the incoming members acclimate to their new position. In early May, many Board members attended the Embracing Our Multicultural Present and Future workshop by Phyllis Braxton at UUCA. In addition, the Board and the Building Beloved Community Team had lunch with Phyllis Braxton to strategize how to move forward with our commitment to intercultural competence. A week later, the Board held a listening session during Middle Hour to hear the hopes and dreams for UUCA in the years ahead.

Pulling this all together, the new UUCA Board of Trustees and the UUCA Professional Staff held an offsite kick-off meeting supported by consultant Terri Werner, to get to know one another and to form a plan for what we wanted to accomplish in the next year. We worked on the following goals:

- Transition from congregation member to Board member
- Shared vision of priorities for UUCA and the work of the Board
- Clarity about the roles of the congregation, the Board, and the Staff
- Strong and healthy relationships between the congregation, the Board, and the Staff
- Board members and Staff know each other well and have a strong partnership with good collaboration and teamwork
- Everyone feels respected, inspired and motivated

We discussed our hopes and dreams for UUCA and included those which were gathered from the earlier listening session. We also discussed and documented our concerns for UUCA. We gathered everyone's input on multiple topics such as the key issues facing UUCA in the next 2-3 years. We prioritized the lists, based on impact, feasibility, and commitment.

We talked about the role of the congregation and how to better include/engage the congregation in the work of the Church. We summarized the work that had already been accomplished by the previous Board, Staff, and other groups within UUCA, especially surrounding the Ends Statements.

We created action items for the next 3-4 months and worked on a 6-month transition plan outline as well as the basis for a Board covenant and a Board-Staff covenant. We were all energized by this work and felt we were off to a good start by laying a solid foundation from which to build. We look forward to a productive and exciting year at UUCA and invite your thoughts and comments.

One excellent way to put into practice our UU principles is to tutor once a week at Homework Haven, a UUCA program for children living in Woodside Gardens. It meets after school and serves approximately 25 elementary school students from this community. These children might be considered at-risk youth, although we prefer the term "kids at hope." Homework Haven meets five days per week from 3:00-5:00 PM in two rooms in the apartment complex, and provides a safe location where students can complete their homework, read, and play games under adult supervision. The students served all attend Eastport Elementary School and are in kindergarten through grade 5; the one staff member and volunteers receive guidance on activities from the staff at Eastport Elementary. The volunteers emphasize language arts and mathematics, so in addition to providing a safe place for these children after school, the program prepares the students to be



successful as they proceed into middle and high school.

Several UUCA members volunteer at Homework Haven, but more tutors are needed so that the students can receive additional, individual attention. If you are interested in being a tutor or have questions, please contact Darrel Nash, nash.darrelnash@gmail.com or Al Pulsifer, ajpulsifer@verizon.net.

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UU Buddhists from the Metro & Joseph Priestly Districts Start New Mid-Atlantic UU Buddhist Fellowship Sangha

On July 18, UUs representing UU Buddhist sitting groups of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Maryland met at the UU Congregation of Princeton to form the first regional subgroup of the UU Buddhist Fellowship. They intended to bring together UU Buddhists of the Metro and Joseph Priestly Districts and are now additionally inviting UU Buddhist sitting groups from as far west in Virginia as Charlottesville and as far south as Richmond, since such groups are already part of an informal UU Buddhist Fellowship region with groups in Maryland. Alan Oliver organized and chaired the meeting. He is not only a leader in the Princeton Congregation and its sitting group but also in the sitting groups in the UU Congregation

of the South Jersey Shore & that at the UU Society of East Brunswick. Two of UUCA's Mindfulness Practice Group facilitators, Bob Ertman & Phyllis Culham, attended. The Chalice Lighting invoked Deep Listening and Mindful Speech for the day, and discussions were preceded and followed by silent meditation.

The new group, the Mid-Atlantic Unitarian Universalist Buddhist Fellowship Sangha, agreed to hold quarterly meetings and to plan a) meeting in connection with the District Assemblies of the Metro and Joseph Priestly Districts and b) an Annual Convocation intended to provide closer, less-costly options than GA and the UUBF Biannual Convocation, so that financially and/or time-challenged UU Buddhists had more opportunities for sangharelationship with others. The group also aspired to offer its presence at GA and to contribute even more symbiotically to the UU Churches which its members attend.

- acceptance of the flooring contract for the entire downstairs and front stairwell treading to be installed in September

- finalizing the purchase of chairs, tables, office furniture for Susan Eckert, Rev. Fred, and Rev. John; as well as furniture for the library and two chairs for the Young room

What is the role of music in church? Can a

church do without music? What would silent services feel like? Do we need professional musicians to provide that music? Can we cut corners in the budget by cutting back on money spent on music? What's the difference between a musical performance outside the church setting and in church? These questions could all potentially lead to lively discussions....

Betsy Jo Angebrandt, a former long time music minister at UUCA, established a strong tradition of dedication to church and music at UUCA. In the year 2015-16 we carry on those traditions and continue to offer musical opportunities to the church community. As music director, I see music as a thread weaving throughout the life of the church, connecting us as we work and grow together. Music is a great community builder and through participation in music performance we learn about ourselves and each other. I don't see music as a frill. I see it as an essential part of church. I see beauty in all styles of music and the act of opening our hearts and ears to different sounds, in itself, I see as a spiritual practice, which can lead to increased awareness and acceptance of differences. My goal as a teacher for 40 years was to bring music to as many people as possible and to involve as many students as possible. So is my goal here at UUCA. Last year with all our music groups we had almost 100 people participating in performing music. There's a place for everyone in this beloved community of musicians. Come join us this year!!


