Stories

Stories are powerful. They can heal, teach, or guide us in a direction. Stories can also limit us. Sometimes a story that has served us well for a long time comes to the end of its usefulness. Sometimes – as the novel and musical *Wicked* reminds us - we hear a familiar story from a new perspective and it opens us to new wisdom. Recently I heard this African proverb that has become a new favorite: "Until the lions have their own historians, the history of the hunt will always glorify the hunter."

The central story of my mother's family, which I heard over and over as a child, was how my grandmother was born in China and orphaned at the age of 6. Her parents, Presbyterian missionaries, both died in the space of a few days fighting a cholera epidemic in 1909. My grandmother's sister, aged only 16, shepherded five younger brothers and sisters by ship and rail to live on their aunt and uncle's farm in New York State. As a young woman, my grandmother was happy to discover the Unitarian Church partly because it did not do missionary work. Late in her life, my grandmother told me, "I thought the Chinese had a perfectly good religion of their own."

This story reinforced my own opposition to evangelism, my respect for the religions of the world, and my enthusiasm for a rational approach to spiritual wisdom. But it did not take me everywhere I wanted to go. Years later, when I began trying to confront structural racism in the church and that led me into social justice involvement, I needed a basis for compassion as well as rationality and respect. I learned that my great-grandparents were directly serving people in poverty: helping those who were hungry and sick, setting up a school, teaching skills that would lead to economic opportunities. I identified with their desire to make faith and love tangible in people's lives. I wondered if some of my great-grandparents' spirit had skipped two generations and been passed to me.

Today, my great-grandparents' faith and work, and grandmother's rational rejection of their missionary efforts, are both part of my story and my journey in social justice ministry. I look forward to hearing your stories, perhaps helping to retell them in newly productive ways, and ultimately to creating new stories with you – guiding and inspiring us all toward Beloved Community in our congregation, our state and our world.

Finance Report through October 2016

Pledge Income:

For year to date (October 2016)our actual pledge income was \$469,628 vs. expected pledge income of \$458,333 for a surplus of \$11,300.

Our church community will be holding its annual Congregational Budget Meeting on Sunday, **December 4**, at 10:30 AM. This is a very important time for our church community, and the Board urges all UUCA members to attend.

Many items will be discussed at the meeting. The two most important are: a discussion of the activities that are now underway to help us plan for our collective future, including steps to prepare for the upcoming ministerial transition; and the review and approval of the proposed budget for 2017.

First, preparing for our future - as we all know, Rev. Fred Muir is retiring in 13 months, and there have been many conversations in our church community on next steps. While no decisions have been made, a strong consensus seems to be emerging to hire an interim minister to help us with the transition. The Board's preliminary thoughts are to move toward hiring an Interim Minister, and to establish an Interim Minister Search Committee at the April 2017 Congregational Meeting to help the Board with this process. This will be part of our discussions at the December Congregational Meeting.

The ministerial transition process should not take place in a vacuum, so the Board has established two teams made up of congregants and Board members to help us plan for our future. The UUCA Vision Team has been working on our collective vision for the future. In addition, the UUCA Governance Team has been working on how we want to govern ourselves in the future. It is our hope and expectation that these activities will help to move us forward as a beloved community.

Rev. Fred's departure after a third of a century at UUCA is certainly hard for all of us. We love Fred! The ministerial transition, however, gives us a real opportunity to think long and hard about our collective future. We must take advantage of this opportunity.

The second item for discussion is the 2017 budget. There has been a lot of work underway this year to improve the budget process. Rev. Fred held numerous meetings that engaged many more congregants than in prior years. At the Congregational Meeting, members will see a budget that has been designed to focus on how our fiscal resources are connected to our core missions. The Board believes that this is a very important incremental step, and we hope that it will serve as a solid starting framework for UUCA budgeting in the future.

We still face real budget challenges, but our hope and expectation is that a focus on our mission and vision will help us move forward. The Board is recommending that the UUCA membership approve the 2017 budget at the Congregational Meeting.

We are moving forward together. As we gather on December 4, we should be mindful of our covenantal commitment to always engage one another in a manner that upholds UUCA as a safe, open and inspirational space.

Whom Can You Welcome Into Your Beloved Community? Elections & Veterans' Day Discussed Together

Thursday, November 10 & Sunday, November 13, UUCA's Mindfulness Practice Group offered its annual Veterans' Day programs. One difference this year is that the programs were scheduled to follow the Presidential Election, so we'd tried to select content which would also lend itself to healing & community building in varied, public contexts. After members sought fellowship & support through UUCA media, we added additional opening and closing words to increase this emphasis in the session. It will surprise no one that turnout was solid: 16 on Thursday, 26 on Sunday. Many Thursday attendees spoke of how much they had healed just from being able to sit with others in silence. Those in the Sunday session found some of Cheri Maples' gathas in meditation challenging but expressed gratitude for seeing from new perspectives.

After silent meditation, Thursday featured a film clip from season 1 of *Tour of Duty*, set during the Vietnam War. It featured a black soldier after the Detroit riot. He had no community to go back to, no home standing; he chose to re-up and stay in his infantry platoon "family," whom he identified as "brothers." Sangha-friends discussed the point that people whose actions we may not initially understand are also looking for "connection," because we all need it. The session opened with the words of Kuya Minogue, Abbess of Green Gulch Farm Retreat of the San Francisco Zen Center, "'Retreating to the mountains' doesn't have to be literal...take refuge in your practice of stillness and kindness." It closed with an exhortation by Roshi Joan Halifax, of the Upaya Zen Center, to find the answers in meditative practice then use them "...stop and look deeply, and let's work together in building not a contentious future but a generative one, and let's not pretend we know, but be open and learn."

On Sunday, meditation was guided by gathas by Cheri Maples, retired police Captain, who led retreats for first responders and was also taking over veterans' retreats from Thich Nhat Hanh. The gathas led us to see the honor and responsibility in public service with arms to appreciate the connection with justice. Opening and closing words, however, were from Susan Piver, practitioner of Tibetan Buddhism. We opened with "Remember that nothing is ever, ever, as good as you hope or as bad as you fear. One day at a time. One. Day. And beyond this, one thought, one moment, one heartbeat. This, by the way, is why we practice meditation..." At the end we heard her recommendations for actual mindfulness practices in these times of change, "Rather than scanning the environment for confirmation of your worst fears, scan it for someone who could use a kind word or glance." And "Finally this: feel what you feel. As best you can, don't pretend you aren't scared, sad, angry, and shocked. No problem. What is a problem is to avoid what you feel and then...work it out on someone else by vilifying them." Sangha-friends were glad simply to be together and to feel a calming connection.




