UUCA As a Prophetic Community

The prophetic liberal church is the church in which all members share the common responsibility to attempt to foresee the consequences of human behavior (both individual and institutional), with the intention of making history in place of merely being pushed around by it. Only through the prophetism of all believers can we together foresee doom and mend our common ways. —James Luther Adams, UU theologian

Last June, when I announced that this year I would end my ministry with you –now in twelve months–there were things I could never have imagined shaping our ministry. In particular, I could never have imagined leaving you under the Presidency of Donald Trump. Not that this would have been a factor in my decision; but now, this is the new reality in which I will spend my last year of ministry with you –and this is a factor. Why? Because as Unitarian Universalists, we claim, with great pride, a faith tradition which has shown bursts of sustained prophetic imagination and action when our nation and communities have been threatened by civil and personal abuse. With bold and clear ministries our congregation has lent its voice to this prophetic posture and acted–sometimes alone, but usually in partnerships–to proclaim our trust in the dawning future of Beloved Community. While no one knows for sure what a Donald Trump presidency will look like... what we know for sure is what he told us during the campaign... His speeches and interviews were filled with language and policies shaped by xenophobia, exceptionalism and class privilege. Mr. Trump relished his blatant lies, his shameful disregard for historical facts and his habit of embellished pronouncements. It was offensive, disheartening, and yes, frightening to hear the ease with which he used racial and misogynist slurs, callous attacks, bullying and demagoguery. I cannot imagine words, behavior or proposed policies that are as repugnant to our way of faith; based on his campaign and most of his cabinet selections (and the views of each person selected), his presidency and policies are as distant as you can get from the spirit of our faith Principles. What he represents is an abhorrence to Unitarian Universalism. Consequently, it is clear to me, now more than ever, that we must collectively reinvigorate our commitment as a prophetic community of faith; we must speak our Principles and show up every time necessary. I know that there are meetings and rallies that I must attend as a way of giving voice to my faith, as a way of “walking my talk.” I urge you to do the same. Now is the time to step forward; now is the time to speak out and partner with those

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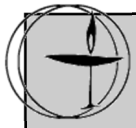

who are resisting the signs of the times.

I asked that we walk together during my remaining months of ministry so that we could live into the prophet church described by James Luther Adams. Now my “ask” feels more compelling, it’s urgent, there is a prophetic edge to my request of six months ago. The immediacy of national and regional challenges brought on by the national elections makes being a UU feel subversive amidst political and religious trends; it feels like we are members of the resistance. But, let us not go “underground,” instead let us be seen and heard. As we think about what we at UUCA might do,

**UUCA in National Movement for Martin Luther King's Birthday:
Annapolis Writers Resist at The Annapolis Bookstore**

On Sunday, January 15 - Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday - UUCA members and friends participated in 'Annapolis Writers Resist', an event in the national Writers Resist movement to speak out everywhere simultaneously on the evening of January 15 for "the ideals of a free, just and compassionate democracy," especially for those who are on the margins or feel fear of the future. Those who responded to the event's Facebook page encountered a link to contribute to the Light House shelter, as local organizers were urged by the national movement to call for action for specific local causes. Annapolis' event differed slightly from some nationally, since it was organized by poets, and all readers were poets. About 80 people congregated in SRO at The Annapolis Bookstore on Maryland Ave., and more turned back out after trying to enter. Some sangha-friends of UUCA's Mindfulness Practice Group managed to make it in to both the program and even to seats.

Max Ochs offered two musical interludes featuring some of the more controversial lyrics of Woodie Guthrie, "By the relief office I seen my people; /As they stood there hungry, I stood there asking/ Is this land made for you and me?" Bob Ertman recited his haiku in three other interludes between longer poetic works by other readers, each haiku sharply on point, e.g., The live oak tree/a hundred years ago/the lynching, inspired by sites he had visited in New Orleans.

The event was organized by Annapolis poet Pamela Murray Winters, assisted by sangha-friend and poetry and drama maven Grace Cavalieri. The latter was able to draw in diverse participants such as the Collective Voices, Sistah Joy Alford, Lady Di, and Brenardo from D.C., and the cable TV show "Sojourn With Words" as well as the poetry-slamming of Analysis (Ken Brown) from Baltimore who's studied Divinity at Howard University. Grace also booked Kathi Wolfe, the author of *The Uppity Blind Girl Poems*, winner of the 2014 Stonewall Prize. Writers Resist participants are asked by the national movement to keep it going long after January 15. No specific plans were made that night, but many cards and books were exchanged and connections made in an Annapolis/ D.C./Baltimore triangle.

Ministerial Transition: Plan and Timeline

The Board this month voted to establish the process for the hiring of an Interim Minister at UUCA and to establish an Interim Minister Search Committee to help with the process. The Board also appointed two Board members to the Committee -- Heather Millar (Chair) and LE Gomez. Any UUCA member interested in serving on the Interim Search Committee should inform any member of the Nominating Committee of a desire to join the Committee (FYI, Tony Hipszer tony.hipszer@gmail.com is Chair of the Nominating Committee). The Nominating Committee will be making recommendations for three additional UUCA members to the Interim Minister Search Committee. Our timeline:

April 2017 Congregational Meeting – The congregation will vote on adding three members of the Interim Minister Search Committee and will discuss and possibly adopt the UUCA Vision.

Spring & Summer 2017 – The Interim Search Committee will work with UUA on the hiring process, receiving input from the Board, the congregation, the Vision Team and the Governance Team. The key issues that need to be resolved are the qualities and characteristics that we most need in an interim minister and the roles and responsibilities of that position.

Fall 2017 – The Interim Search Committee makes recommendations to the UUCA Board for the hiring of the Interim Minister. The target end date of the term for the Interim Minister of summer 2019 coincides with the UUA normal selection process to call a permanent Senior Minister to commence service at UUCA in the summer of 2019.

December 2017 Congregational Meeting – Governance issues are discussed, with a goal to finalize governance at the 2018 Congregational meetings. The UUCA Vision is finalized.

Throughout 2018 – The Interim Minister helps the church come together as a congregation in preparation for the upcoming permanent search for a Senior Minister. This entails engagement of the Board, the congregation, and the Governance Team. The key issues that need to be resolved are the qualities and characteristics that we most need in a senior minister and roles and responsibilities of that position, the Board, and the congregation.

April 2018 Congregational Meeting - The Senior Minister Search Committee membership is voted on by the UUCA congregation to facilitate the search. UUCA governance models are presented and discussed.

Summer-Winter 2018 – The Search Committee compiles information and reports about UUCA and its needs to be sent to UUA for the upcoming search. UUCA as a whole comes to consensus on governance models to help steer the Search Committee's efforts.

January 2019 – UUCA Search Committee begins receiving names of candidates (could be an internal or external search) and starts the interviewing process.

May-June 2019 – Senior Minister is “called” by the UUCA congregation in a special Congregational Meeting, with service to begin soon after.

We are off and rolling! Let us use this important process as a way to grow together, to listen to one another, and to move closer as a beloved community.

Note that the next UUCA Board meeting will be held at 6:45PM on February 13, 2017.

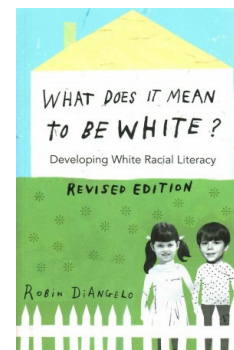
From the Building Beloved Communities Team—*RACE: How is Racism different From Prejudice?*

The Building Beloved Community (BBC) team has been holding monthly Middle Hour sessions to explore how often we each think about race - ours or someone else's; how and when we each learned about race; and, most recently, how we each have prejudices and how these are related to racism. Despite having over 20 participants for most of the sessions, the emphasis has been on providing multiple opportunities for participants to share their stories and experiences.

The next Middle Hour session is scheduled for February 12, and discussion will center around Robin DiAngelo's definition of prejudice, found in her book, *What Does it Mean to be White: Developing White Racial Literacy*. For her, "Prejudice: Learned pre-judgement based on stereotypes about the social group that someone belongs to. Prejudice occurs at the individual level; all humans have learned prejudices." (p. 46)

All are welcome and encouraged to join us. We all have learned biases and prejudices. Exploring and acknowledging them in a safe and positive environment gives us the opportunity to further our understanding of racial prejudice and racism.

Watch for BBC discussion sessions during Middle Hour.

Show up and support **AWAKE Ministries**, a unique way of UU worship and prophetic imagination. The fourth Sunday morning at UUCA is a spirit-filled worship service of word and music; and on the second Sunday at 4:00 PM is **AWAKE Talks** which features music and a local speaker with a valuable and meaningful story to share.

Connect with others in all the ways that UUCA offers, and especially remember the opportunities during Middle Hour (10:10-11:10 on Sundays) and in our area-wide small groups. **Habit For Humanity**, the **Light House** (shelter and programs), **Prison Ministry**, and other mentoring opportunities offer other ways to connect with the larger community.

Show up to witness your faith at gatherings on **Lawyers Mall** (Annapolis), and in Baltimore and/or DC. Often these feel spontaneous but many of them are planned ahead. We'll do our best to keep you informed.

How can we walk together during these times that will likely be an affront to our UU values and Principles? Above is a list of some of the ways—and it's always more meaningful when we can do it together. What better way to sustain, grow and share the hope that is Unitarian Universalism!

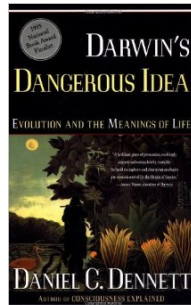

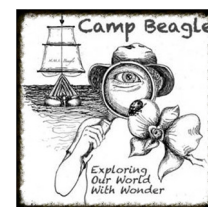
