This news comes after my nearly five-year tenure with the church – first as your Children's Ministry Coordinator, overseeing your children's RE classes and



executing your seasonal event programming, including leading our beloved Camp Beagle; and most recently as your acting Director of RE (DRE), administering the church's full RE portfolio on a part-time schedule over the past year.

My last day of employment will be Sunday, May 20. The new full-time DRE is planned to be hired by August 2018 upon completion of a formal search process conducted by the newly assembled DRE search committee led by Rev. Kathleen.

Although I originally expressed interest in this full-time role, as a mother of two with specific salary requirements that would allow me to place my children in full-time care, I was not able to pursue the position further.

Despite this, please know it has truly been my pleasure to serve you in these varied capacities over the past five years. Through our time together, I have gotten to know and care for each and every one of you. I have

Review of Annual Meeting and Looking Ahead

An Update from the UUCA Board of Trustees President, Heather Millar

What an incredible Congregational Meeting we had on April 8th! Thanks to all who contributed their talents and time to prepare for this meeting, especially those on the Nominating Committee, 8th Principle Task Force, Governance Team, Finance Committee, Endowment Board, Congregational Meetings Committee, Board of Trustees, Administrative Team and our Co-Moderators. Congratulations to our 2018 Shinning Lights: Ted Hall, Thornell Jones, Sean Woolums and Karen Murphy-Keddell. With a sense of loss and great appreciation for their service, we recognized the four members of our Board of Trustees who are leaving the Board: Linda Rhoads after 5½ years, Ken Apfel, Maury Marks and Gina Williams each with 3 years of service.

Maury Marks, Financial Officer, reported a mostly positive financial picture. We had a \$27K surplus at the end of 2017. The money is being allocated according to priorities raised during and since the December 2017 Congregational Meeting: UUA Fair Share Dues, Director of Religious Exploration and Intern Minister. Actual pledge income for January and February was \$92K, \$20K more than expected. However, our expenses for these two months exceeded our income by \$1290.

In reports from Rev. Kathleen Rolenz, Rev. John Crestwell, Evelyn Spurgin from the Governance Team and Jackie Heimbuch from the Endowment Board we heard about where we have been and plans for our future. Diane Moreau presented background about the 8th Principle. A highlight of the meeting was when the congregation voted overwhelmingly to approve the 8th Principle Resolution with only one vote against. Rob Malone, Chair of the Nominating Committee, presented the candidates for Board of Trustees, Co-Moderators and Nominating Committee and all were approved.

Looking Ahead: Rev. Kathleen is helping us fulfill the initial interim tasks of examining our history, clarifying our identity and developing new leadership. The Governance Team is working with the Board to identify the best form of governance for our congregation and helping revise our documents to reflect this form and our commitment to "accountably dismantle racism and other forms of oppression in ourselves and our institutions."

These are exciting times at UUCA. Please pay attention and join in where your talents and interests take you.

The office staff will have more time to handle the weekly workload and prepare for the upcoming Sunday. As a result, my Sunday office hours will be altered to 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Sundays, to provide 2 days off some weeks for rest and family time. Many have come to depend on assistance from a Sunday morning office person. It is my plan to help congregants become more independent the Sundays I'm away. In the meantime, please reach out with any questions or concerns.

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Criminal Justice Task Force

Update on all those POSTCARDS we wrote to LEGISLATORS

Over the last few months people attending Sunday services wrote over 300 postcards to their legislators in Annapolis about criminal justice reform. Now the 2018 session is over: here are our updates:

We asked for **opposition** to SB 122 - The Governor's "Comprehensive Crime" bill - because it would have reintroduced numerous mandatory minimum sentences. In the end, only a single new mandatory sentence passed, the others were defeated and some positive bills included.

We asked **support** for **SB1137/HB0291 – Correctional Education** – it **PASSED:** Requires baseline vocational and educational information be recorded for each inmate, in order to support implementation of an educational plan before an inmate's release.

We helped **override the Governor's veto** of **SB543/ Hb694 - Ban-the-Box** State college applications can no longer require an applicant to check the box for criminal history. Information can be required after acceptance to a school.

These are small but important steps forward in criminal justice reform.

THANKS so much to everyone for writing those postcards!

Our UUCA Criminal Justice Team (which overlaps with our UULM–MD Restorative Justice Task Force) will be back in the narthex next year with more postcards -Keep your writing hand in good shape!!!

What does this mean for UUCA? As you'll read later on in this newsletter column, UUCA is in active search for a full-time DRE, to start August 1 or earlier, if possible. looks good, with revenues exceeding expenses by \$16k. This is typical for first quarter, as some of our biggest donors in the January, February and March stewardship groups pay their pledge in full at the beginning of the year; expenses are also in check. Pledge levels at the end of March were improved over February, but still about \$15k behind our target goal of \$540k. *When you receive your pledge form, please complete and return it promptly.*

One of the most important ways we keep expenses down is with the dedicated support of volunteers. Each of us has varying amounts of time and energy to give and whatever that is – please know it is vital to the health and success of the congregation. I'd like to give a special shout-out to Charlie Gross, who wears several volunteer hats at UUCA: Co-collector (a responsibility he shares with Patti Patterson), Finance Committee member, Stewardship Captain, and office assistant/handyman. I am extremely grateful for all that he does, but in particular his weekly help in the church office and around the buildings and grounds – Thank you, Charlie!
