Religious Exploration by Dayna Edwards

I am so glad to be back at UUCA, a congregation that has truly given me both roots and wings. I come back to you with now seven years of experience leading religious education programs and it is so exciting to be a part of this innovative staffing model, that we are trying this year. As our team works diligently to prepare for the new year, let me share with you some of what we're planning for the fall.

Our Children's Programming will continue with the excellent Middle Hour religious education that you have come to expect. Keely Longo has stepped into the position of DRE for Children's Programming. There are now several volunteer opportunities available for people who love working with our little ones.

We are considering expanding the children's chapel that has typically taken place when the children are sung out once per month. We need your voice to determine how this expansion will look. We'd like to offer children's chapel every Sunday instead of childcare. This is a prime opportunity for children to learn and celebrate their UU identity by practicing being in worship in a developmentally appropriate way. *Keely and I are looking to form a children's chapel team of about four people who will rotate leading the children's chapel.* There will still be opportunities for people to share their expertise and/or passion as you all have done in the past. Children's worship

can take many forms, so if you'd like to help shape it, please contact <u>Keely</u> directly.

Our youth ages 10 and up will keep all of the beloved curriculum from previous years, Building Bridges, OWL, COA, and YRUU consecutively. <u>Julie Burman</u> (DRE Youth) and <u>Laura Schrank</u> (Youth Coordinator) want to hear from you.

There are two ways you can help our new staff get acclimated to their new roles at UUCA. First, volunteer to help on Sunday morning. Even if you don't have children (or if your children are grown) your time and relationships mean the world to our children and youth. Second, assume good intentions as we get used to our roles and this experimental staffing model. In Camp Beagle we teach our children to experiment, be scientists, try new things. What an excellent opportunity we have to model that for them. Compassion, understanding, and humor will take us to places we have yet to imagine. All Sunday School programming will start September 16.

This training will focus on specific scenarios that can make or break our interaction with visitors. We will also be looking at how we can implement the 8th principle of inclusion so that we avoid macro and micro aggressions, RSVP so we can know exactly how many will be in attendance.

Administrative Update by Susan Eckert, Business Administrator

In less than three weeks the church will resume two services, Middle Hour, and the corresponding return/ramp-up of regularly occurring programs, meetings and activities that mark the church year mid-September through mid-May. With time short, I'll be brief. At the close of July revenues exceeded expenses by \$19.5k year-to-date, which is a great place to be at this time of year. Revenues have been strong thanks to robust sales in the Art Gallery, building rental income, generosity in the Sunday Plate, and high enrollment for the perennial favorite "Camp Beagle". On the flip side, expenses remain relatively in check. The overall level of pledges on the books as of July 31 increased slightly to \$539,008 - very close to our fiscal year budgeted goal of \$540,000 and another positive sign for mid-year financials. I want to give a shout-out and thank you to some very special volunteers who have given a tremendous amount of time, energy and/or financial resources toward maintaining church buildings and grounds.

- Craig Beyler and Matthew Beyler for donating materials and labor to repair the concrete stairwell outside the DRE office and classrooms.
- Lisa & Pat Fleeharty, Win Decker, and Joe Jehl for the never-ending tending of the rain gardens.
- Dianne Moreau for taking the lead on replacing the 18year old carpet in the Sanctuary, Foyer & Narthex.
- Craig Beyler and Fred Eckert for donating materials and labor to replace the foot bridge between the main building and Fahs House.
- Charlie Gross for the countless projects he undertakes each week, from re-striping parking lots to changing light bulbs and water filters, and most of the ongoing handyman tasks that continually arise.

In closing, I hope to continue with some Sundays off in the fall. Office hours in September will be the 2nd, 16th & 30th.

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Board of Trustees Update

It was with sadness and regret that I accepted the resignation of Jane Carrigan as Board of Trustees secretary. Jane has done and continues to do much for our congregation and was beginning to contribute even more as our Board secretary. However, she found events in her life were preventing her from participating as she had planned. Following UUCA bylaws, Board members voted to ask Caryn Jackson to serve as Board Secretary until our next Congregational Meeting when the congregation will vote. I am delighted to report that Caryn has accepted. We look forward to her perspective on the Board.

The UUA held its General Assembly (GA) in Kansas City in late June. UUCA was represented by Betty Crowley, Bob Ertman, Thornell Jones, Phyllis Marsh, Heather Millar, and Dianne Moreau. By example, the UUA demonstrated ways we can alter how we function as an institution. This is especially important as we implement the 8th Principle to "accountably dismantle racism and other forms of oppression in ourselves and our institutions."

Co-moderators lead GA business meetings efficiently and with clarity. One assisted while the other handled the microphone. They supported each other, sometimes being leader and other times being helper.

To promote consensus, three options regarding voting were offered. 1) I support the motion. 2) I do not have enough objections to oppose the motion. 3) I object enough that I need additional conversation. For discussion two microphones were provided. At the "Pro" mic advocates for the motion spoke. At the "Con" mic, those who needed to raise concerns spoke.

A bylaw amendment was introduced to change the gender specific nouns of "women and men" in the second of our sources to non-gender specific "people." To prepare for general discussion of the motion, delegates were given a few minutes to talk with another person about thoughts on how this amendment improves the bylaw and concerns about the proposed change.

The Board of Trustees Report was given with a moderator interviewing Board members who sat on stage in comfortable chairs. As the Board members discussed their answers with each other to two questions, we learned about what the Board actually does, how it functions and what is being planned.

To have delegates experience communicating within covenant and generate input from all on the vision for and the mission of Unitarian Universalism, a process was implemented that began with small group discussions. Ideas expressed in this intimate setting were shared with other groups. Common themes were identified.

These ideas were assembled into a word cloud and presented to the entire Assembly. Over 600 delegates participated in this activity. While content was gathered, more importantly the delegates experienced deep conversations, they practiced respectful listening and sharing.

We are looking at these and other examples of doing things in new ways as we revise our governance documents and look to conduct our business and activities to be more accessible and inclusive. The next Board meeting will be held on September 10th beginning at 6:45 PM in the library.

Light House and Light House Bistro Update

A brief look at how the Light House has been serving the community and their new initiatives and services.

The Safe Harbor Resource Center (SHRC) was established months ago to work with those in the community who are in danger of becoming homeless, homeless individuals who seek assistance but not shelter, and those who are otherwise in need (assistance with preventing utility disconnection, etc.). This operation is on the back side of 10 Hudson St. with a separate entrance that precludes those seeking special assistance from having to compete for attention with the resident population and regular building visitors. This initiative has been a huge success and there are plans to expand services from 20 hours per week to 40 hours in the future. The SHRC is in need of volunteers (visit their web page).

The B.E.S.T program is being reorganized, with more emphasis on apprenticeship and on-the-job training. The next class will start in early October. Expect to see more Culinary BEST students at the Bistro as their training progresses in the Fall. Those in the maintenance track will benefit from a new partnership between Light House and the local ABC
